FACTS ABOUT HEARTWORM

These parasites can live inside the arteries of a pet's heart and lungs and feed on their blood. They are spread by mosquitoes who bite and feed on an infected pet which then go onto bite another pet, infecting it with the heartworm larvae. Signs include a dry and persistent cough, lack of energy, weight loss, and weakness. Heartworm disease starts slowly then advances to major lung damage or heart failure. Now might be the time to desex your pet. There are so many pets requiring homes already that unplanned litters add more pressure to find homes for all these animals. WHAT EVERY PET OWNER SHOULD KNOW ABOUT SNAKES!

Did you know that there are around 140 species of snakes that live on the land in Australia? Roughly 100 species are venomous but only 12 snake types have a bite that can kill a person or an animal which includes the Brown Snake, Death Adder, and Tiger Snake. Snake activity is linked to temperature with most snakes being active when it is between 26 -32 degrees Celsius. Usually, they are active for most of the day in spring, and early morning and late afternoon in summer. Pets are often attracted to the movement and they will aggravate this new 'toy' to their own detriment. Here are some tips to keep snakes at bay.

*Keep your lawn short so snakes can't hide in the long grass

*Trim up to 30 cm underneath bushes and shrubs so snakes can't hide there *Remove debris such as boards, rubbish, firewood, flagstones or large rocks *Don't panic if you see a snake, leave them alone. Train your dog commands such as 'leave it' or 'come away.'

*Walk your dog on a leash so you have control if you encounter a snake If you pet is bitten, bring them into the clinic immediately. If you can safely take a photo of the snake please do so, but only if it is safe. It will help us in determining treatment, but you and your pet's safety always comes first.

FIVE TIPS FOR BRUSHING YOUR PET'S TEETH.

We all know the importance of care for your pet's teeth, but how do you do it and how often? Here are a few tips to help you.

1/ Start by adding a special pet toothpaste with a nice flavour to the toothbrush, never use human toothpaste as it is not good for our pets.

2/ With your pet nestled comfortably in your lap (depending on size) hold the brush at a 45-degree angle to the gumline

3/ Brush in a circular motion with gentle pressure on the teeth and gums 4/ Brush for about 30 – 60 seconds remembering to do the back teeth too 5/ Reward your pet for their good behaviour – it makes it easier for next time Alternatives to teeth brushing include large, hard products such as dried pig's ears, rawhide bones, and some special chewing toys that clean the teeth and the gums as they chew away. We recommend brushing at least 2 -3 times per week and getting regular dental check-ups as part of your pet health care routine.

TICKS – The Pet Vampires!

Ticks can be a deadly parasite for your pet with over 10,000 pets affected by tick paralysis each year. Signs of infection include vomiting, excessive drooling, difficulty in breathing, and loss of appetite. If you find a tick, remove it by its head at the point closest to your pets' skin – never squeeze the tick's body. Once removed dab the area with a mild antiseptic and book your pet in for veterinary care as soon as possible. We can advise you on the most effective insecticide treatment for your furry friend. Daily checks for pets are advisable. Ticks are the size of a match head when they first attach themselves but get bigger as they feed.
